Copyright Governance: The Regulation and Enforcement of Copyright on the Internet

Conversations on Copyright is an annual seminar series co-organised by the University of Edinburgh, the University of Glasgow, and the University of Strathclyde. It brings internationally renowned academics and practitioners to Scotland to initiate new conversations on historical and contemporary copyright policy and practice, doctrine and theory. This event will be of interest to intellectual property lawyers primarily, as well as professionals working in the cultural and creative industries.

While the general focus of the event concerns the regulation and enforcement of copyright on the internet, the speakers will be addressing a broad range of issues, including: patterns of distribution of copyright-protected and public domain works online; the role of ISPs in regulating copyright infringement within a European context; intermediary obligations within the UK; and the role that 'networks of power' play within the digital environment in shaping national, regional and international copyright policy.
