The Post

The School of Political, Social and International Studies wishes to appoint a Senior Research Associate to work with Professors Keith Negus (Goldsmiths, University of London) and John Street (UEA) on a part-time basis (25%FTE) for 15 months on a project entitled 'Digitisation and the Politics of Copying in Popular Music Culture'. This project is part of the RCUK CREATE Centre (see www.create.ac.uk). We are looking for someone with knowledge of popular music culture and experience in interviewing, archival work and other research skills.

Background and Context

The School of Political, Social and International Studies is located in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities. We are a dynamic, friendly department, with a reputation for highly rated research and excellent teaching. In RAE 2008, 80% of the School's submitted work was ranked as internationally recognised or better. Staff in the School are active researchers. Several are engaged in interdisciplinary projects and ventures such as the ESRC Centre for Competition Policy and/or media@uea.

The School has particular research strengths in international relations, the study of the EU, media and cultural politics, public policy, and political theory. Close research ties have been formed with colleagues in Philosophy, American Studies, Development Studies, Environmental Sciences, Film, Television and Media Studies, History, and the ESRC Centre for Competition Policy. The School has a supportive research culture and a lively postgraduate community of MA and PhD students.

CREATE involves several other universities besides UEA. Job Description

The person appointed will be expected to work as directed by the Principal Investigators (Keith Negus and John Street) as part of the CREATE project, investigating digitisation and its implications for the politics of copying in popular music culture.

This will involve arranging, conducting and transcribing interviews with musicians and others within the music industry. It may also require some element of archival research.

The successful candidate may be expected to contribute to the writing of reports, conference papers and journal articles..

The successful candidate may not have research experience that relates directly to the subject of this project, but knowledge of popular music culture and history will be important.

The precise duties will be agreed in discussion with Professors Negus and Street.
